

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hat a fun concert this has been to put together! Like revisiting old photos, the choristers and I have enjoyed returning to a wealth of well-known songs—each with a poignant memory attached to it. The music for this afternoon's concert was selected for different reasons, but each one includes one element that sets it among our favorite things. Chosen by choristers and family members from a list of repertoire from the past five years, the songs represent special performances, tours, and musical games, but most of all, they are simply our favorites!

We are honored once again to collaborate with excellent musicians; today's concert features some of our favorites: Mary Bisson (French horn), Jonathan Jensen (Bass), Joshua Bertaux (Drum Set), Mahdalyna Svirlova (Violin), and of course our beloved Patricia McKewen Amato (Piano).

Another one of our favorite things is a composer well known to the CCM community. Dr. Betty Bertaux not only founded CCM 35 years ago; she also began a choral series which celebrates its 30th year this season. The Betty Bertaux Series began when the field of children's choral music was rather bleak. It has provided choral conductors and music educators a wealth of folk-song arrangements and original compositions with inventive instrumentation, creative word painting, and imaginative combinations of compositional techniques. Many of the pieces lend themselves to early elementary educational settings: developing music literacy and part-singing without sacrificing ingenuity, beauty, or expression. All three choirs will perform pieces by Betty, and the Concert Choir will showcase four of her works that span her earliest arrangement to her most recent composition. Among some of our other favorite composers featured today are Zoltán Kodály, Leonard Bernstein, and Benjamin Britten.



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



On this, the occasion of our Thirty-Fifth anniversary, Children's Chorus of Maryland and School of Music awards this plaque to Betty Bertaux, Founder and Director Emeritus, with our deep and abiding gratitude."

We speak for all CCM students, parents, volunteers, staff and teachers over the past 35 years in thanking Betty for her undying commitment to the musical and personal development of the thousands of children entrusted to her. We appreciate her pioncering leadership in the field of children's choruses, a vision which made CCM possible.

We also wish to thank Betty for her roles in:

- promoting the idea that children's voices could become instruments of fine music-making;
- expanding the quality and scope of children's choral music by drawing on the best of the American music repertory to create a variety of exceptional compositions and arrangements made especially for children's voices;
- sharing with other music directors and educators nationwide vital insights into children's vocal development, thus protecting the voices of both their students and her own;
- elevating the performance standards of children's choruses nationwide by providing her exceptional guest conducting services, by always advocating music literacy training over rote instruction, and by taking CCM choirs to perform at conferences and performance tours, thus repeatedly demonstrating what is truly possible musically when the children in a chorus are fully trained as competent and capable musicians.

This year, Dr. Bertaux also received the Organization of American Kodály Educators (O.A.K.E.) Lifetime Achievement Award, and was the subject of Mairee Pantzer's Master's Thesis, for both of which we offer our additional congratulations.

Children's Chorus of Maryland warmly welcomes our guest performers in this afternoon's concert. We are grateful for their collaboration and artistry!

A graduate of Children's Chorus of Maryland, Joshua Bertaux is a freelance drummer in the Catonsville area. Josh plays drum set for worship bands for church events and performs in a band; he has also recently opened a drum studio.

Mary Bisson joined the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra as Third Horn in 1983. Born in Kentucky, she began her orchestral career playing in her hometown orchestra in Owensboro at age 13, and at 19 won the Principal Horn position in the Maracaibo Symphony in Venezuela. A few years later she moved on to the State of Mexico Symphony in Toluca, Mexico as Associate Principal Horn. At age 22, she was hired by the Louisville Orchestra as Third Horn, where she played for six seasons. During summers, Bisson played in the Chautauqua Symphony in upstate NY, a festival orchestra consisting of players from all over the US. In 1983, she won the Third Horn audition in Baltimore.

Bisson is an active teacher, soloist, chamber musician and recitalist. She has made numerous recordings with the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra and has released a solo CD, Evening Banquet —Music for Horn & Soprano, produced by Barry Tuckwell. Bisson has performed with the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra, Baltimore Chamber Orchestra, Louisville Orchestra, Owensboro Symphony, Loudon Symphony, Gettysburg Chamber Orchestra, and the Baltimore Choral Arts Society. She has been featured at the International Horn Society, Sarasota Music Festival, Barry Tuckwell Institute and the International Women's Brass Conference. Bisson studied horn with Philip Farkas at Indiana University and is a contributor to the book, *Philip Farkas*: Legacy of a Master. In addition, Bisson has given recitals and master classes at Florida State University, Interlochen Arts Academy, University of Oregon, Towson University,

Gettysburg College, Mesa State College, The College of New Jersey, Peabody Conservatory and Queensland Conservatorium in Brisbane, Australia. She is also a founding member and director of the Barry Tuckwell Institute. Bisson has been on the faculties of the Peabody Institute, the Sunderman Music Conservatory at Gettysburg College, Towson University, St. Mary's College and Essex Community College. She currently teaches horn students at Montgomery College and The College of Notre Dame. Mary's daughter, Martha Robichaud, sang with CCM for 9 years.

Rose Casciero has been playing the flute for five years under the instruction of Professor Sara Nichols. She has performed at the White House, the Mid-Atlantic Flute Conference, and at the Waldorf School of Baltimore, which she currently attends. Rose has training in Irish Step Dancing, various world dance forms, theater, and vocal music. A current student in the Children's Chorus of Maryland, Rose will attend the Carver Center for the Arts and Technology for Vocal Music next year.

Versatile musician *Jonathan Jensen* grew up listening to his older brother's 78 rpm records and hearing folk music and jazz. He plays a diverse array of music on various instruments including percussion, mandolin, banjo and tin whistle-all of which he has played on stage with the BSO. Although his primary orchestral instrument is the bass, he often doubles on keyboards and has done several orchestral arrangements. When not playing with the Symphony, he plays piano for contra/English country dances and performs with the Baltimore Mandolin Ouartet. Mr. Iensen studied bass with Warren Benfield and attended Interlochen Arts Academy and Northwestern University. Before joining the Baltimore Symphony, he held the position of Principal Bass with the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra in Canada, playing with the Grant Park Orchestra of Chicago in the summer. Last December, the Lyric Choir performed the world premiere of Jonathan's most recent choral composition, Christmas Carol. Jonathan's daughter, Fiona, was a CCM member for five years.

Veronica Page is thrilled to debut as a choral conductor with the Children's Chorus of Maryland. Her musical career began when she joined CCM seven years ago, at the age of nine. After her



A WORD FROM ALYSON

"Children's Chorus of Maryland offers a quality of music education that is uniquely singular in the greater Baltimore-Washington area. It trains the whole person musically, socially, emotionally, physically, and aesthetically. I am a product of its training having joined the Concert Choir at thirteen years of age more than twenty years ago. 


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
